How to get your news and photos into print

Is it news?

If a parish or school has a coming event that invites participation, it is news. If a pastor, principal, parishioner or staff member wants to announce a special accomplishment, it is news. When a parish or school has a new program that is unique, we want to share it with our readers. Readers should ask themselves, "Would readers across the diocese be interested in learning about this news?" If the answer is yes, send it to *Arkansas Catholic*.

What should I put in my news release?

At the very least, we need to know the basics: who, what, when and where. Sometimes "why" and "how" are also important. Make sure everyone's names are spelled correctly and that the news release is typed or printed clearly. We need a contact person and phone number in case we have questions. (See example on page 5.)

HINT: The Briefs form on pages 8-9 can be used as a guide to preparing any news release.

What kind of photo can I send?

We prefer to receive high-resolution photos in JPEG format. Please set your digital camera for its highest resolution.

For photos taken with an iPhone, please email them to us at "actual size." If you are unsure about your phone or camera's capabilities, please contact us.

Caption information should come along with the photo, including names of people in the photo. We prefer that the photo is action-oriented, not a posed shot. For example, you can shoot your subjects when they're looking at what they're doing, or at each other — not looking at the camera.

With any photo, whether an electronic file or a regular print, we have to apply strict standards to ensure it will look good on newsprint. Unfortunately, we cannot run every photo that is sent to us.

When do you need the story and photos?

Our deadline is 10 days before our Saturday publication date. For example, if you hope to see your announcement about a July 28 event in the July 21 issue, we would need the information by July 11. If you are requesting that we come to cover an event, it is helpful to send information to the editor at least three weeks before the event.

Why do you shorten or edit my submission?

An important but difficult job of an editor is choosing what will be printed in the next issue and how to make it fit in the space available. Sometimes letters, columns and news releases are too long for the space. The editor has to choose what is most important and write a shorter article. Also, the editor must edit the article to apply journalism style, which is outlined in the stylebooks for the Associated Press and Catholic News Service. Letters and columns are sometimes shortened to fit the available space, but the original meaning is not changed. Overall, concise writing is always appreciated.

50th annual Pickle Festival to be held September 13

The 50th annual Pickle Festival kicks off Saturday, September 13 at St. Cecilia's Catholic Church in Springville. Festival coordinator Mary Smith was proud to announce the start of a new tradition — crowning of King and Queen Pickle. One male and one female parishioner who donate the most volunteer hours to the parish in the past year will be crowned and honored at a special dinner from 5-8 p.m. in the parish hall.

“We wanted to honor all of our volunteers who make it possible to provide countless ministries to our parishioners,” Smith said. “In particular, Father Brad Gilbert wants to recognize the two most dedicated volunteers at St. Cecilia’s.”

From 1:30-5 p.m. free children's games, such as a dunking booth and pickle painting, will be held. Pickles from around the world will be on display throughout the day. At the dinner, parishioners will get to sample the pickles, including ones from Argentina, Spain and Trinidad. Tickets for the barbecue beef dinner are \$7 for adults, \$3.50 for children 5-13 years old and free for children under 5.

All proceeds from the dinner will be given to St. Cecilia's Nursing Home in Springville. The nursing home will fund craft projects, such as knitting and painting, with the money. Last year, \$2,000 was raised.

Committee chairwoman Mary Smith covered all the bases when she wrote this news release. We even have her e-mail and cell phone number in case we have any questions. The news release arrived in plenty of time for the editor to make sure it is printed on the Briefs page. This festival sounds kind of fun. Maybe we can have a freelancer take a few photos for a special photo page.

■ **NEWS BRIEFS**, on page 2 of each issue, are a mainstay of *Arkansas Catholic*. The short articles and photos can be about parish and school events (past or coming), new programs and personal accomplishments. We must get the information two weeks before the issue date. Because of limited space, we cannot publish honor rolls or confirmation and First Communion photos.

■ **OBITUARIES**: While most Catholic newspapers don't run obituaries regularly, *Arkansas Catholic* believes this is an important service for our readers. However, we are limited in the amount of information we can print.

■ **LETTERS**: We want to hear from our readers about what they think of stories and columns in the newspaper. The best way to convey this is through "Letters to the Editor." Letters are more likely to be published if they address a specific article in a recent issue. We want to hear from readers when they disagree with something in an issue — and it would be nice to hear any compliments too.

■ **GUEST COLUMNS**: Stories about religious experiences or lessons learned are sometimes told best by the people themselves. Guest columns run regularly on the Columns page. We can't guarantee publication, but if you follow these guidelines your chances are greater for getting it into print.

What's happening in your parish?

Short articles and photographs about parish and school events and accomplishments are published weekly in *Arkansas Catholic*. Articles and photographs should be sent within two weeks of the event. Photographs can be black and white or color and will only be returned if requested.

Obituaries

Arkansas Catholic publishes obituaries of current and former Arkansans twice a month. The funeral home, parish or family may submit the obituary.

Information should include the person's name, age, parish, date of death and list of immediate survivors and their hometowns. Longer biographical articles are printed about religious sisters and brothers, deacons, priests and prominent lay people. Due to limited space, the publication date of the obituary cannot be guaranteed. There is no fee to have an obituary published.

Letters to the Editor

Arkansas Catholic welcomes letters to the editor on any relevant topic. Letters should be typed and no more than 300 words. The letter must be signed and include a daytime phone number. Letters will be edited for spelling, grammar, space limitations and clarity. Because of the many letters received, publication cannot be guaranteed. All letters, however, are thoughtfully read and considered.

Columns and Opinions

Arkansas Catholic welcomes submissions to its Opinion and Columns pages in the form of guest columns. Columns should be typed and no more than 600 words. Columns and letters express the viewpoint of the author and don't necessarily express the views of the *Arkansas Catholic* or Diocese of Little Rock staff.
